Wulf's Christmas letter for the 2025 holiday season

This year, I did find the time to focus on Christmas cards - first in paper and then in digital form. But I am running behind. The paper cards (they were few) were mailed a bit late, and may have arrived after the Christmas holiday. Apologies for that.

Meantime, I got stuck coding the little "Xmas micro-site". This will remain a work in progress, also in preparation for the next Christmas season, and beyond. The "mailto:" and "tel." links don't work on all Android operating systems (made by Google, powering approx. 80% of all smartphones worldwide). The Bolsheviks running that company have no shame! Sorry, but this is outside of my control ...

Eastwards, not too far from here, people are having a disagreement - exemplified by an argument over on what date our Lord Jesus Christ was actually born, or, rather, whether this should be celebrated according to the Gregorian, or the Julian calendar. The disagreement was brought about, in no small measure, by so-called dissidents who had emigrated from the USSR to the USA - in order to then proceed and first of all diss America.
